MOTHER TONGUE SOCIETY OF THE ESTONIAN ACADEMY OF SCIENCES

The Mother Tongue Society (1925–1952 Academic Mother Tongue Society) was affiliated to the University of Tartu in 1920–1946 and to the Academy of Sciences in 1946-1998, and became associated with the Academy of Sciences in 1998. The office of the Society has been located in Tallinn since 1956.

The membership of the Mother Tongue Society includes 340 active members, including 6 honorary and 32 foreign members.

The goals of the Society are as follows:

- to promote research into the Estonian language, genetically related languages, and ethnology;
- to promote the use of Estonian as the state language and the national language of communication;
- to generate public interest in the Estonian language and the genetically related languages;
- to promote academic communication among philologists and joint events and cooperation with people interested in the Estonian language.

Main activities of the Society at present:

- regular meetings with presentations in Tallinn and Tartu;
- language days outside Estonia in cooperation with local Estonian societies;
- J. V. Veski Day (annual conference held on June 27);
- student conferences with the participation of secondary-school students;
- publishing (scholarly publication Emakeele Seltsi aastaraamat 'Yearbook of the Mother Tongue Society', popular language journal Oma Keel 'Our Language', books dealing with language);
- work with schoolchildren (incl. language days and contests);
- collection of vocabulary not listed in contemporary dictionaries;
- standardization of literary language.

Committees of the Mother Tongue Society

The work of the society has taken place in committees.

• Dialect committee (1926–1940; 1963–1996)

The task of the dialect committee, which was re-established in 1963, was to promote the collection and research of dialect material; it organized contests in the collection of language material and place names. By the 1990s the Society had fulfilled its task with regard to the collection of older dialects; its new goal was research into variation in contemporary language.

As of the end of 2007 the joint dialect archive of the Mother Tongue Society and the Institute of the Estonian language held **5,250,000** word slips, **140,000** pages of texts, **3,000** hours of sound recordings.

• The language committee (1969-1979; 1993-) has discussed topical problems in correct usage and the planning of the standard language. In 1972 and 2002 the committee held word-invention contests which yielded a large number of new words that have been adopted for everyday life and concepts of the European Union. In 2008 a word-collection contest was held among schoolchildren.

• Under the auspice of the society, also other divisions have been active: the shorthand committee (1930-1932), the folklore division (1966–1995), and the division of stylistics and linguistic poetics (1977–1992).

The library of the Society holds about 6,000 publications on Estonian and its genetically related languages since the 19th century until the present.






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
